

Jano faced wrath of floods, betrayal of loved ones courageously

Muslim Aid owns paralyzed lady, provides nutrition needs, medical care and brings her back to normal life

Thatta: There are lots of reports on flood-affected people, living in miserable conditions and facing multifarious problems. Thousands of people in flooded areas have been shifted to safer places after their houses were submerged in the water. Most of the displaced people have taken shelter with their relatives, living in the safe areas, but there are cases, which were not put on record that were left by their own kith and kin in testing time.

Such is a case of 38-year-old Jano, when flood hit her village Goat Khamlu Khan (Sajawal); she was left alone with her husband by her in-laws. Jano was pregnant and was unable to walk. She gave birth to a child on her way from Sajawal to Qamber. “A family fleeing from Sajawal takes me and my husband on the tractor trolley and brings us (Jano, her husband and children) with them in this IDPs camp”. I was paralyzed and couldn’t move. There was no medical facilities in the camp for 5 days, Jano informed.

Now there is a medical camp (established by Muslim Aid with proper paramedical staff and C-sections facilities) where a lady doctor and lady health visitor (LHV) helping me and treating me well. Lady Doctor and LHV use to visit my camp and they gave me different tips of therapy. My nutrition needs were addressed properly by Muslim Aid and now I can walk easily and I visit medical camp at my own without any help.

Muslim Aid also provided me with a tent, food packs, clean drinking water, hygiene kit and awareness sessions helped me to walk again. Telling about her in-laws, she said that she doesn't know where they are but I am satisfied that my husband is with me here in this camp. I am thankful to Muslim Aid for all its support which helped me to recover.
